Course requirements and goals of the subject

Prerequisites: the compulsory History of Architecture subjects of the first four semesters have to be finished successfully (for regular students).

Dates: 12, 19, 26 September, 3, 10, 17, 31 October, 7, 14, 21 November, 5 December **Main goals of the course**:

- 1. Students are to get acquainted with the most important historic monuments of the European and North-American architecture between 1750 and 1914. They should understand the relationship between them; learn the most important cultural influences manifested in the architecture of their age.
- 2. The morphology of the monuments is to be studied.
- 3. The visual memory skills are to be developed by means of in-place sketches during the lectures.

Basic requirements:

- 1. <u>Sketches</u> (format A/4, 4 times in the semester) of architectural morphology following the lecturer's sketches. The completion of these drawings verifies also the student's attendance at lessons. Missing drawings must be supplied at the next lecture. Unacceptable drawings also must be made up by the time of the last lessons. (Dates: 26 September, 17 October, 7, 21 November)
- 2. <u>Semester drawing</u> (format A/3, 1 or 2 sheets of paper) of a building or ensemble. Working out the selected a building or ensemble with selected ground plans, constructed plans, sections, elevations, views, or details with optional scales. Elevation and detail must show the compositional and architectural elements and the plastic values of the architectural articulation. Technique: any kind of <u>manual</u> rendering techniques can be used, but pencil with aquarelle on drawing paper is preferred. Drawings by computer or photocopies are not allowed. (Consultations: every week after the lectures.) Deadline: 8 December (Monday) 12:00. (With late homework fee till 19 December, Friday 12.00).
- 3. <u>Two test papers</u> (31 October, 5 December). The exercises of the tests can be solved with freehand sketches based on the list of "key monuments". Failed test can be repeated on 15 December or (as a repeated exam, with fee) on 19 December. The condition of the acceptance of the subject is that both tests are at least passed (2). Code of Studies, Section 122. (9) Students are only allowed to participate in second retakes or repeat completions of summative assessments if they have participated in the assessment or its first retake, repeat or late completion.

Other requirement:

Lecture attendance: 70% is required. (70% during the theoretical lectures and 70% during the practical lessons).

Evaluation

The offered final mark will be the average of the sketches (10%), the semester drawing (40%) and the test papers (25-25%).
